AMATEUR RADIO

 A bill has been introduced in the US House of Representatives which would protect amateur radio volunteers against liability beyond their control.

HR 2623, the Amateur Radio Volunteer Services Act of 1993 was introduced by Kansas Congressman Jim Slattery.

If enacted, the bill would change the Communications Act of 1934 to protect amateur volunteers from personal financial responsibility resulting from their volunteer activities, as long as there was no "willful and wanton misconduct" on the volunteer's part.

A 1986 incident was cited by the backers of the legislation, where a Michigan ham assisted FCC personnel in tracking down an alleged malicious interference case.

After the case was settled, the accused licensee brought a defamation action against the volunteer ham who provided the evidence to the FCC.

HR 2623's language states that protection against such actions is "necessary and reasonable."

 Results are in from an antenna comparison test on the April 1993 flight of the space shuttle Columbia.


On two consecutive orbits, astronaut Charlie Precourt, KB5YSQ, transmitted on a window-mounted antenna in the shuttle cabin, then on an external antenna mounted in the cargo bay.

One of the teams on the ground who measured the received signals was the Motorola Amateur Radio Club of Plantation, Florida.

The group reported an 11 dB improvement in performance on the shuttle's outside antenna compared to the window-mounted unit which has been used in previous shuttle amateur radio experiments.

Similar results were measured by an IBM club in Boca Raton, Florida, receiving 12 dB more signal on the external antenna over the internal.

HDTV News

The Clinton Administration is going ahead with what is described as a vague plan toward the creation of a national information superhighway. Their "Agenda for Action" represents a first step in a plan for a national information infrastructure.

Major cable, telephone, computer and equipment manufacturing groups applauded the plan. The Administration plans to promote private-sector investment in the infrastructure and will work with Congress to pass some sort of legislation by the end of 1994.

The legislation is supposed to "...increase competition and ensure universal access in the communications market - particularly those, such as cable television and local telephone markets that have been dominated by monopolies."

The Administration plans to spend \$1.2 billion a year on national information infrastructure projects.

Meanwhile, the FCC HDTV advisory committee plans on having a prototype of the "Grand Alliance" HDTV system in the test bed by May 1994, with a possible recommendation coming from the committee by next summer. This is the only system that the committee is having tested at this point. At their last meetings, the committee pressed the Alliance to adopt a 1,080 active line screen.



- Europe has delayed implementation of the Eureka-147 DAB system for broadcast. The concerns at this point are over financial and frequency allocation issues.
- The FCC has initiated an inquiry into aural modulation measurement for broadcasters. The commission is seeking information that will enable it to set meaningful modulation limits of peak amplitude with regard to peak duration, peak recurrence rates and the time interval over which the peaks are to be counted.
- Nearly 1000 AM stations have applied for migration to the new 1610 to 1700 expanded AM band. One station, KXEN St. Louis is giving up it's 1010 Khz 50KW daytime signal for a 10KW/1KW allotment in the new band. Computing the allotment is expected to take several months.
- The M Street Radio Directory says that Country is the number 1 radio format in the U.S. followed by Adult Contemporary and News/ Talk/Sports.

FCC Regulatory Fees By Paul Stoffel

The September Chapter 24 Newsletter published an article detailing the proposed FCC fee schedule. The FCC would be allowed to collect annual fees from the industries they regulate.

At last month's chapter meeting, it was mentioned that the fee schedule includes an annual fee of \$7 for anyone holding a Commercial Radio Operator's License (FCC Rules Part 13 which includes General Radiotelephone Operator License. and First Second or Third Radiotelegraph Operator's License).

To offer some clarity, H. Walker Feaster of the FCC explained that the "onetime-only operator license fee of \$7 would be assessed when a person initially applies for an operator license, and that the fee would be added to the \$35 application processing fee. Those people who already have an operator license "are not required to pay any annual regulatory fee for their Operator license." An exception would be those who are applying for a restricted license.

As far as the other categories in the fee schedule, Feaster said, "A mailed notice from the FCC will detail your pertinent categories and their associated fee. The notice will also include a payment due date." The first fee payments could begin as soon as April 1994.

The FCC will publish a fee schedule rulemaking proceeding next month (Nov. 93). In the proceeding, the FCC hopes to define the term, "governmental entities". The following FCC Public Notice exempts governmental entities from having to pay the regulatory fees:

PUBLIC NOTICE: FCC to Implement Regulatory Fees

On August 10, 1993, the President signed the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Bill of 1993 (Public Law No. 103-66). The Budget act contains a new regulatory fee schedule designed to recover those costs incurred by the Commission that are attributable to the Commission's policy and rulemaking actions, as well as its enforcement, user information and international activities.

The new fees apply to most current licensees and to other entities (e.g., cable television systems and telephone companies) which benefit from Commission regulatory activities, other than licensing or applications processing functions. The regulatory fees do not apply to governmental entities, amateur radio operator licenses and nonprofit entities.

The legislation also grants the Commission authority to periodically review the statutory fee schedule and to adjust the fees to reflect changes in its appropriation from year to year. It may also add, delete or reclassify services under certain circumstances. Additionally, the legislation authorizes the Commission to charge a 25% late payment penalty and to dismiss applications or revoke licenses for non-payment of the fees. The Commission may also waive, reduce or defer payment for good cause in specific instances. Finally, the legislation requires the Commission to collect "small" fees in advance for a full license term and to permit payment of "large" fees by

The Commission plans to implement the new fee collection requirement as expeditiously as possible. New regulations will spell out specific procedures concerning collection methodologies, payment schedules and penalties.



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BROADCASTERS CLINIC 1993 SCHOLARSHIP

Applications are due by October 15

Chapter 24 is offering one scholarship consisting of any two days of the three day Broadcasters Clinic taking place November 9, 10 and 11 in Madi-

The scholarship will be awarded on the basis of the following criteria and maximum number of points accumulated:

- 1) Must be a current member of Chapter 24
- 2) Attendance at 6 of the 12 meetings prior to the October 15th application deadline
- 3) Employment in or a student of a broadcast related field
- 4) Must have SBE National dues paid for the current year

Points will be assigned as follows:

- a) 5 points for each month applicant has at least one article published in the Chapter 24 newsletter spanning the 12 issues prior to the October 15th application deadline
- b) 5 points for certification, any level
- 2 points for each monthly meeting attended in excess of the 6 required

In the case of a tie, final selection will be by the elected officers of Chapter 24 or by a committee appointed by those officers, excluding any whom may have applied. If more than one applicant, an alternate will also be selected based on the second highest number of points. The scholarship winner will be required to write a summary article to be published in the chapter newsletter.

Tom recently had a request from TNN for a 2 Ghz wireless camera involved in race coverage at Madison International Speedway. If you haven't done so, please get your wireless mic information to Tom.

Chair Leonard Charles indicated the National elections are currently in progress, and you should have received a ballot along with candidate biographies. Your ballot must be received by the National Office on or before September 22, 1993. The SBE Fall National Convention is being held in Miami September 29th through October 2, 1993. The National SBE and NAB have reached an agreement on a joint convention. Beginning in October of 1994, SBE, RTNDA, SMPTE and the NAB Radio Convention will be held concurrently. Conferences will be centered around a jarge

exhibition that will include all aspects of broadcast engineering. In the spring of 1995 the SBE will produce the entire engineering portion of the conference. The bottom line is SBE is getting out of the exhibit arena, leaving that to the NAB, and concentrating on education. Work continues for the SBE Midwest Regional Uplink from the Broadcasters Clinic this November. The program will be a panel discussion consisting of National SBE Officers. Satellite time will be provided by Global Access on transponder 10v on ASC 1, 128 degrees West; satellite coordination is provided by Teleport Minnesota; and, uplink facilities provided by MRC Telecommunications. Letters promoting the uplink have been sent out nationally to all SBE Chapter Chairs.

In old business, Fred Sperry indicated he had not received any scholarship applications for the Broadcasters Clinic. The application deadline is October 15th. The scholarship will cover two of the three days of the clinic. Send a letter in the form of an application to Fred at the T.O.C.; the criteria is in the newsletter.

In new business, John Laabs of the WBA had contacted Leonard Charles inquiring if Chapter 24 had seen the RF Safety Pen which the Texas Association of Broadcasters is promoting, and wanted to know if it was a worth-while item to market. Chapter 24 has agreed to critique the device.

Edwards is a former employee of Sinclair Broadcast Group and is involved in a local marketing agreement (LMA) in Pittsburgh with his WPTT-TV and Sinclair's WPGH-TV. He is also purchasing WNUV Baltimore from Arby and will enter a LMA with Sinclair's WBFF-TV there. WVTV and WCGV will operate under a LMA as they currently do under their present owners. Edwards owns 30 percent of both of WVTV Licensee Inc. and WNUV Licensee Inc., with Carolyn C. Smith holding 70 percent. She is the mother of the owners of the Sinclair Group. Sinclair also owns WTTE-TV, Columbus, Ohio. Filed August 16.

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MM Docket No. 93-225, FCC 93-370 Modulation Levels AM, FM and TV Aural

The FCC has issued a notice of inquiry on the measurement of broadcast aural modulation levels. The commission is seeking comment on what should be the definition of over modulation and on methods of measuring modulation limits. They are asking for a definition of the phrase "peaks of frequent occurrence" and if peaks of short duration over 100 percent should be given consideration and what their time and frequency should be. Also, the FCC would like information on whether or not modulation limits should be replaced by emission limits. Comments are due November 5, 1993. and replies are due December 15, 1993. Published in the FEDERAL REGISTER on August 23, 1993, pages 44483 to 44484.

GC Docket NO. 92-52; FCC 93-363
Reexamination of Policy Statement
on Comparative Broadcast Hearings

The FCC is proposing that successful applicants in a comparative hearings be required to operate their stations for a period of three years before being able to transfer them. The current rules require that they hold the station for a period of one year. The purpose of this rule is to cut down on application abuse. Comments are due October 13, 1993; replies due October 28, 1993. Published in August, 1993, FEDERAL REGISTER, pages 44484-44485, and comment period was extended in September 15, 1993.

MM Docket No. 93-226; FCC 93-373 Restrict rounding of the Distance Separation Calculations

The FCC is proposing to restrict the rounding off of distance separations in cases of short spacing of FM stations. The rules now allow for rounding off to the nearest kilometer. The FCC would like to change the rule so that stations that do not meet the minimum distance requirements (short-spaced stations) would have to round off to the nearest 1/100th of a kilometer. Comments due October 18, 1993, and replies on November 2, 1993. Published in the FED-ERAL REGISTER on September 22, 1993, pages 49278 to 49279.

FCC 93-382 Standards for Assessing Forfeitures

The FCC published the new list of fines in the August 25, 1993, issue of the FEDERAL REGISTER on pages 44767 to 44769. The became effective August 3, 1993.

FCC Rulemakings

Final Rules

ET Docket No. 92-9; FCC 93-351 Redevelopment of Spectrum to Encourage Innovation in the Use of New Telecommunications Technologies

The FCC has issued final rules for relocating fixed microwave operations in the 2 Ghz bands when necessary for the implementing of emerging technologies. This action allows for the future authorizations of new wireless communication services. The bands included are 1.85-1.99, 2.13-2.15, and 2.18-2.20 Ghz bands which were used for Private Operational-Fixed Microwave Service. These rules provide for the methods of transition including timetables, fee payments and tax certificates. Effective on October 4, 1993, and published September 2, 1993, in the FEDERAL REGISTER, pages 46547 to 46550.

MM Docket No. 92-304; FCC 93-416 Renewal Reporting Requirements

The FCC has issued a final rule requiring all full powered broadcast stations to report at the time that they file their applications for license renewal if their stations are on the air or have discontinued operations. This rule is to aid the FCC to determine if the grant of renewal is justified and in the public interest when a station has ceased operation. Rule is effective October 15, 1993, and was published in the FEDERAL REGISTER on September 15, 1993, pages 48323 to 48324.

The FCC has extended the comment and reply period on this inquiry. The new due dates are October 29, 1993, for comments and December 29, 1993, for reply comments. The FCC is seeking comments about its policies and rules when measuring AM Directional antennas. The extension was published in the FEDERAL REGISTER on August 27,1993 (page 45311) and the original notice was published on July 6, 1993 (page 36184).

Ampex Cuts Product Line

Ampex is reorganizing its product line by dropping much of its older analog equipment and broadcast lines. Ampex will focus on its DCT Digital line for television production. They will also focus on production of their DST high speed data-storage equipment. Ampex also has plans to sell its tape division.

Ampex has lost \$200M over the last three years and has seen its VTR sales drop from \$184M to \$79.1M between 1990 and 1992. Also, Ampex's majority stockholder, N.H. Holdings owned by Ampex's Chairman Ed Bramson, has filed for bankruptcy. The company went through a series of owners during the 1980's and lost much of its management and engineering staff—particularly after Bramson took over in 1986. That buyout left Ampex with a large debt load which still affects the company.




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Broadcasters Clinic is Next Month

New Tower Lighting Rules


The FAA has published a revision to Advisory Circular AC 70/7460-1H, which references those regulations regarding lighting and marking of elevated support structures.

The FAA "advises" that all intermediate beacons currently installed within tower structures be replaced with two beacons mounted on the exterior of the tower face.

Another change deals with flashing of obstruction lights. All lights on a single structure should flash at the same time.
